How to Write a Testimony Tract

- Meet a need. Ask yourself, "How has God met a deep need in my life?"
- You don't have to share the gospel, but you should point people to God.
- Share one thought well. Don't try to pack in everything you'd like to say.
- Start off with a grabber statement or something to get their interest in the first sentence.
- Think about appropriateness in terms of what you'd want your kids or other kids in the church to read.
- After you write it and are fairly pleased with it, set it aside for a few days and then pick it up and read it again.
- Use proper English and apply the things you learned in school. (It matters to some people!)
- Let others give feedback. If you want it to be good, plan on writing it and rewriting it several times.
- Have several people proof it. Different people catch different errors.
- Use your words to paint a picture. Connect with some of the five senses when possible: taste, touch, smell, sight, hearing. Don't just say, "I felt sad." Describe what it felt like to feel sad.
- Don't use christianese (religious terminology) like "I got saved," "born again," "testimony," "found the Lord," etc.
- Keep it short (~750 words)
- Use a reasonable font size. (11pt or more)
